









What is co-operative & community-led housing?

Co-operative and community-led housing means bringing people together to decide what kind of homes and communities they want to live in. People with a shared vision can come together and have an influential voice. They play an essential role alongside councils, developers and investors to create affordable homes which meet local community needs.

Co-operative and community-led housing comes in many shapes and sizes. Small groups of friends buying a house to share,

leaseholders setting up a tenant management committee, community members buying local land on which to develop new housing, and people who want to develop sustainable homes – these are all examples.

People have more control of where they live, and work with others to achieve a shared goal.

Communities create homes.



Ownership & control

Co-operative and community-led housing involves local people in housing decisions – so the outcomes are often more successful.

- Having a voice in the development and management of homes gives residents a sense of empowerment, pride and ownership
- Communities become more resilient and develop the capacity to tackle a range of issues that affect them
- Anti-social behaviour is reduced
- Residents feel happier being part of a supportive community

Homes are built in areas where they are needed – often this is in places which commercial developers wouldn't consider for housing.

- This improves housing supply and the provision of affordable housing
- Areas which have fallen into decline can be regenerated and empty homes are returned to use
- Small, tricky sites can be put to good use
- The pressure on green space is reduced through shared communal spaces
- More people can enjoy the benefits of home ownership, with a supportive safety net

Get inspired

Taf Fechan

Taf Fechan Housing Co-operative is a fully mutual housing co-operative in Gellideg that was developed in partnership with Merthyr Valleys Homes. It consists of 12, two bedroom flats. All tenants are members of the co-op. This means that they are in control of running the co-operative and are in charge of everything from rent collection and tenant selection, to procuring cleaning and maintenance services.

Brithdir Mawr

Brithdir Mawr Housing Co-operative Limited has been acting as the steward for an 80 acre farm in Pembrokeshire since 1994, based on the principles of sustainability, collective living and education. The residents try to meet as many of their needs as possible from the land, including growing their own food, coppicing their firewood and generating all of the electricity they use from the river, sun and wind. The community share resources and meals regularly, host visits and activity days and are able to accommodate small workshops.









Loftus Village Association

Part of the regeneration of the former Pirelli
Factory site in East Newport, Loftus Village
Association is a shared ownership housing
co-operative developed in partnership with the
Pobl Group, based on the principles of
'greener, cleaner, leaner' living. Tenants
manage the scheme democratically and have a
management agreement with Pobl to provide
housing services, including maintenance of the
communal open areas across the garden
village as well as a community garden. The
community host regular events, share
resources and procure services as a collective.

OWCH

The Older Women's Cohousing project

(OWCH!) in High Barnet is the first senior

cohousing project in Britain. Its 26 members

(aged between early fifties and eighties) live in

a mix of privately owned and rented housing

association homes. They created and now run

the project themselves, each member taking

part in the communal decision making process.
